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WHAT I LEARNED DURING MY SABBATICAL

Pastoral leaves of two or three months after seven years of full-time service are a long standing Christian tradition with roots in Scripture. The principle of a Sabbath rest is enshrined in the Ten Commandments because God rested on the seventh day. After being on call 24X7 for seven years, a lengthy period of rest from the demands of church ministry comes as a welcome opportunity for a minister to be ministered to through activities that nourish his or her soul. It allows for uninterrupted family time and time alone to pray, reflect, read, write and pursue activities that recharge one's spiritual batteries. I was very grateful when Third Church granted me a sabbatical during July and August, and to the Northeast Fellowship for its grant program to help member churches cover the cost of pulpit supply during a sabbatical leave.

I looked forward to my sabbatical and did a lot of advance planning to gain the full benefit of it. My personal goal was to do all I could to make it a mountain-top experience. I wanted my sabbatical to be a space of time when I could accomplish some personal goals and refresh my soul by becoming:

- closer to God through study and reflection;
- closer to Barbara by spending quality time with her;
- closer to my congregation by rededicating myself to my pastoral work there.

Barbara and I made travel plans to visit historic sites for my research and travel to new places for our enjoyment. We also had plans to celebrate Barbara's birthday on Aug 4 at a special place in New Hampshire with my sister and her husband coming from Seattle to see us that week. A few weeks before it was all set to begin Barbara's cancer diagnosis hit us like a bolt out of the blue. It changed everything. We were no longer in charge of our plans, but come what may we were determined to go through this "adventure" together. There were tests and consults, and lots of waiting. We were hoping the surgery would be scheduled for the week of July 6 but it was scheduled for July 31 the very day we were planning to go to New Hampshire. The day of the surgery finally arrived and thankfully it went very well. After the surgery we had to stay in town so they could monitor her healing, and there was more waiting on test results to learn what follow up treatment will be necessary. Barbara says the tests and surgery were relatively easy. The waiting was the hardest part. As July gave way to August my sabbatical was turning out to be something quite different from what we had planned. I could almost say


WHAT I LEARNED DURING MY SABBATICAL

It was more valley than mountain top experience. But the amazing thing we now realize as we both look back at my sabbatical rest from ministry, it wasn't a time of discouragement and disappointment. My sabbatical truly turned out to be the mountain-top experience I had hoped for. It gave me everything I was originally looking forward to. In fact, not only were our prayers for good medical outcomes answered, but my goals for personal renewal were met more fully than I ever imagined.

- we are closer to each other by having gone through this trying experience together.
- we are closer to our congregation because of the many cards, letters and prayers
 that came to us, and what a source of encouragement they were and still are. Barbara also felt the care of the Fellowship churches and members through their cards.
 Visiting Fellowship churches and seeing her name on their prayer lists was very
 meaningful to her.
- we are closer to God because of answered prayers and the feeling of being cared for.

My sabbatical is now over. I am grateful for it and I feel refreshed. God didn't give me the sabbatical I planned for, but he gave me the sabbatical I needed. The timing of my sabbatical was perfect. The main spiritual lesson I learned from it is best illustrated from an obscure episode in Israel's history. Once a neighboring king waged war against Israel and was defeated. The next year he returned with an even larger army confident of victory because he told himself that Israel's God was a god of the mountains but not of the valleys. This time he would fight and defeat Israel on the lowlands where their god would be powerless to help them. Through a prophet God assured the king of Israel of victory over that king a second time to teach him and everyone a lesson: The Lord is a God of both hills and valleys. He is ever-present wherever we are, and even a trek through a shadowed valley can be a mountain top experience when God is with us.

Ministry Report From Pastor Toby Quirk, New Boston Congregational Church

Spirit Warrior 2015 Men's Conference
US Military Base, Yongsan, South Korea
September 18-19, 2015
"Men Don't Retreat in Battle"

An old army buddy, Chuck Stecker, Director of "A Chosen Generation", a national ministry teaching strategies for the intergenerational church, invited me to be the keynote speaker at an annual men's conference in South Korea on September 18-19. I enthusiastically accepted the opportunity to minister God's Word and God's love to our military warriors serving in a critical outpost facing down an unpredictable, unstable enemy—North Korea.

Since the conclusion of the Korean Conflict, US Forces have been posted in South Korea as a deterrent, successfully preventing an incursion from the north. Yongsan is the largest US installation, where the headquarters of US Forces, Korea and Eighth US Army have their headquarters, thirty miles south of the demilitarized zone (DMZ), the most heavily guarded border in the world. As recently as August this year North Korean soldiers planted an antipersonnel mine in the southern sector of the DMZ and two Republic of Korea (ROK) troopers were critically injured. The South Korean/US response was a barrage of propaganda via loudspeakers aimed at the North Korean Army. The North responded with an artillery barrage aimed at an unpopulated area of the DMZ.

Tensions in South Korea were heightened when the Supreme Leader of North Korea, Kim Jong-un announced that he was reopening a nuclear reactor and he had improved his capabilities to launch a warhead in a missile.

My host for the trip, Men's Director, Tommy Kramer, informed me that the theme for the two-day conference was "Men Don't Retreat in Battle". The Holy Scriptures are replete with references to spiritual warfare, and for any Christian believer the conflict between the forces of light waging war against the forces of darkness is clearly a reality, not merely a parable or a metaphor. In the minds of our modern day warriors, these scriptures are all the more compelling.

The weeks before departing my home in Nahant, Mass. I spent hours in prayer and meditation, seeking the Spirit of God for instruction and equipment to accomplish the mission He had assigned to me. I felt God leading me to gather plenty of content for the four plenary sessions, and arrange that content in modules, so I would be able to organize each message in response to the needs of my audience.

If I understood the "voice" of God, I felt that He was saying, "Receive my wisdom and my grace before you attempt to achieve anything in My Kingdom."

After a long journey from Boston's north shore to Seoul, South Korea, my first encounter with the "Men of the Morning Calm" was a morning Bible study in a restaurant in the hotel where I was staying on Thursday morning, the day before my event would start. I met eight men, all leaders of military units or sections, some military, some civilians and all dedicated to a life of service to their country and their Lord. The study from 2 Kings, chapter 22 was a lesson about King Joash, who trusted his God, Jehovah, and lived a life of blessing. Trusting God: the key to all my prayerful meditations and the foundation of all four of my sermons for "Spirit Warrior".

That night I attended a workshop for music ministers, given by an amazing musician, song writer and Bible teacher, Danny Byram. He explained the essentials of sacred music and how God loves authentic worship from His children. Danny became my "battle buddy" as we co- led the conference.

Friday night was our first plenary session at the South Chapel, Yongsan Military Base. The men and their wives were in attendance. My topic was: SPIRITUAL WARFARE IS A REALITY.

"Our spiritual battle," I said, "is often waged in the midst of those with whom we treasure close, loving relationships. Relationships like comrades-in-arms, workplace associates, friends and family members."

We all know that our closest friends and loved-ones can cause us the most emotional harm because we love them so dearly. So I presented two weapons for victory in this close-in battle:

- 1) The Grace of God received in morning reflection and meditation.
- 2) The power of immediate forgiveness.

Saturday morning after breakfast, the Men of the Morning Calm and I uncovered God's Word together in Session No.2 about Courage. From the Book of Joshua, a military commander, having taken over leadership at the death of Moses, receives from God the command to "Take Courage!" Then as Commander Joshua succeeds in his first battle at Jericho, experiencing a miraculous siege of a walled fortress city, without sword or bow, but simply obeying God and marching around the wall. Then Joshua experienced defeat in the first battle of Ai because he neglected to consult with God. He failed in battle because he failed in prayer. In his arrogance, he launched ahead on his own initiative, attacked Ai and suffered a humiliating retreat across the desert. Repenting, he sought the Lord, received specific divine instructions and executed a complicated attack plan carefully laid out by God Himself. Then Joshua, having courage born of dependence on God, trust in God and obedience to God, won the victory and gave glory to God.

Lesson: when you trust God and obey His voice, He imbues you with courage, and you will have victory. When you don't you won't.

Session No. 3 emphasized the difficulty that military men (and many men of many occupations) have when the source of their identity is challenged. When a man is proud of his military service or his job as a fire-fighter or policeman or fisherman or corporate leader, and that occupation is taken from him through disability, retirement or business failure, his identity is challenged. In the book of Daniel, a multi-talented handsome young Israelite is captured with his countrymen, transported to a foreign land and enslaved. Most men would have been devastated because everything that defined his identity was violently, ruthlessly stripped from him. But not Daniel. He refused to eat at King Nebuchadnezzar's table, but opted to take only simple nutrition and live a simple life. He maintained his dignity and his identity because his identity was not dependent on any man -centered value, but only on the Lord his God. His entire life was characterized by exceptional wisdom and strong leadership, all inspired by divine grace and power.

The men in that room agreed that they would purpose in their hearts to push in to God's Word, God's discipline and His grace to strengthen their identity as a child of God, not as a military warrior. So that on the day when they would leave their chosen profession, they would not be susceptible to the forces that drive men to despondency and alcohol and drugs and violence.

Session No. 4 was pleasantly and blessedly unpredictable. Although I had prepared a "brilliant" concluding address, God moved on us to spend this remaining time together by allowing His presence to fill the room and fill our hearts. I gave a short summary of the preceding three sessions and opened the Bible to Luke 9:1 where Jesus gave his disciples the charge to go and drive out demons and cure diseases. Just prior to that He showed them how to do it by driving out a demon called "Legion" from a demoniac, healed a woman simply by her touching the hem of his garment and raising an apparently dead girl to life.

Then we prayed. We prayed for a rededication to Jesus, for stronger faith, for more love in our hearts for our families and workmates, for healing of injuries, diseases and emotional trauma. We prayed and God displayed his presence and power.

So as I reflect on this ministry trip, I am extremely grateful to Chuck Stecker, who made the connection for me, Tommy Kramer who planned and ran the conference, all the warriors who participated with me and mostly in our loving, graceful Lord, Jesus Christ. To Him all glory and power.

"Well, because you talked about it, it was like the Lord had spoken to me. He was telling me: "Finally, be strong in the Lord and in His mighty power. Put on the full armor of God, so that you can take your stand against the devil's schemes." Ephesians 6:10/11

This is now my ethos. I will continue my daily walk and use this as my guide. The armor of God will be my strength to be the man I want to be.
